## **Discussion:**

Mayor Larson said that Councilwoman Reynolds wanted to talk about banning multi-family housing. He asked Terry Brady, Municipal Attorney, to explain the process. He said that from a legal stand point, NJ requires low and moderate housing in required in every municipality. He said the Barnegat Light may be 99.9% - 100% developed. He said that Barnegat Light does provide for multi-family housing. He advised that removing multi-family housing from Barnegat Light may create an issue with the Council on Affordable Housing or developers that want to build low or moderate housing. He said that this should be initiated by the Planning Board and then reviewed by Council or vice versa and this would require updating of the Master Plan. There was more discussion about this topic. Mayor Larson asked Council to consider if they wanted to put something together for the Planning Board for the December meeting or

- Ocean County Clerk's Office has Property Alert Service. You can register online and you will
  receive email alerts when documents are filed related to your property. He explained that there was a
  recent incident in Barnegat Light where someone was trying to sell a property that belonged to
  someone else. He urged everyone to protect their property. Flyers were available.

Rich Brodman, 4 E 10<sup>th</sup> Street, thanked Public Works for their help after the Taxpayers Clean-up event, He said that 40-45 people attended the event. He added that the Sandpaper published an article about the event. He said that the Taxpayers' Association had a big year and would like to donate playground equipment for the bay beach. Councilman Wellington said that when they purchased the playground equipment, under state contract, a sales representative gave Barnegat Light drawings of what could be done there. He said he would ask Stuart to come up with a price.

Connie Higgins, 10 East 11<sup>th</sup> Street, suggested that the Borough send out letters to the homeowners to inform them of the new water/sewer rates and tell them the reason for the increase and when it will be effective.

Rich Brodman said that he saw in our code book that there was supposed to be a \$200 surcharge for sprinkler systems.

Mayor Larson talked about Long Beach Township dredging at High Bar Harbor and that they wanted to use our street end to unload the spoils. There was a discussion about this matter.

# **RESOLUTION 2022-118**

RESOLUTION OF THE BOROUGH OF BARNEGAT LIGHT, COUNTY OF OCEAN, STATE OF NEW JERSEY, APPROVING THE 2022 ADDENDUM OF THE 2017 MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL PROGRAM FOR PUBLIC INFORMATION WHICH IS PART OF THE NATIONAL FLOOD INSURANCE COMMUNITY RATING SYSTEM

WHEREAS, the Borough of Barnegat Light is enrolled in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) to provide flood insurance for the residents of Barnegat Light; and

WHEREAS, the NFIP provides for insurance premium discounts for communities that voluntarily takes part the Community Rating System (CRS) program that is a component of the NFIP; and

WHEREAS, the Borough of Barnegat Light takes part in the Community Rating System and presently holds a Class 7 Rating, which the Borough's Office of Emergency Management (OEM) strives to maintain or possibly improve; and

WHEREAS, the Borough disseminates flood hazard information that not only is beneficial to the residents through mitigation of the hazardous effects of flooding, but is also beneficial in maximizing credit in the, CRS program by conforming to the Program for Public Information standard outlined in the 2017 CRS Coordinator's Manual; and

WHEREAS, all the other municipalities on Long Beach Island also participate in the CRS program and are trying to maintain their flood insurance discounts for their residents; and

WHEREAS, a Multijurisdictional Program for Public Information was formulated including all six municipalities on Long Beach Island to deliver consistent outreach messages to all island residents; and

WHEREAS, the OEM has determined that it was necessary to Program for Public Information (PPI) in order to maintain the present Class 7 Rating; and

WHEREAS, the OEM recommends the Borough approve the Program for Public Information Amendment; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Barnegat Light, that the Borough supports the adoption of the 2022 addendum of the 2017 MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL PROGRAM FOR PUBLIC INFORMATION WHICH IS PART OF THE NATIONAL FLOOD INSURANCE COMMUNITY RATING SYSTEM, a copy of which is available for review at the office of the Municipal Clerk, 10 East 7<sup>th</sup> Street, Barnegat Light, NJ 08006.

WHEREAS, the Borough of Barnegat Light duly advertised for the receipt of bids for the West 23<sup>rd</sup> & West 27<sup>th</sup> Streets Reconstruction & West 23<sup>rd</sup> Street Utility Replacement Project; and

WHEREAS, at the time, place and date set for the receipt of bids, formal bids were received by the Borough as follows:

WHEREAS, said bids were taken under advisement and have been reviewed by the Borough Engineer and it has been determined that Mathis Construction Company submitted the lowest responsible bid in accordance with the bid specifications, said bid being in the amount of \$605,518.61; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the Mayor and Borough Council of the Borough of Barnegat Light to award a contract for the West 23<sup>rd</sup> & West 27<sup>th</sup> Streets Reconstruction & West 23<sup>rd</sup> Street Utility Replacement Project to Mathis Construction Company, the lowest bidder; and

WHEREAS, part of the funding for said project comes from financing awarded by the NJ Department of Transportation, and the award is, therefore, subject to NJDOT review and approval, per their grant rules and regulations.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Borough Council of the Borough of Barnegat Light, County of Ocean, State of New Jersey, as follows:

That the Mayor & Borough Council of the Borough of Barnegat Light do hereby award the contract for the West 23<sup>rd</sup> & West 27<sup>th</sup> Streets Reconstruction & West 23<sup>rd</sup> Street Utility Replacement Project to Mathis Construction Company, at the price of \$605,518.61, subject to NJDOT review and approval.
- 2. That the Mayor and Borough Clerk are hereby authorized to execute an agreement with Mathis Construction Company for said project, said agreement to be in conformance with bid specifications and bid submitted by Mathis Construction.
- 3. That a certificate of availability of funds executed by the Chief Financial Officer is annexed hereto. The following line-item appropriations or ordinances constitute the availability of funds for this contract:

WHEREAS it is the desire of the Borough of Barnegat Light to contract with the municipalities of Beach Haven, Surf City and Harvey Cedars to jointly employ a Construction Code Official/Building Subcode Official, and a Building Inspector.

- 1. The Mayor and Clerk are hereby authorized and directed to enter into and execute a Shared Services Agreement with the municipalities of Beach Haven, Surf City and Harvey Cedars for the provision of Uniform Construction Code enforcement and administration services.
- 2. A copy of this agreement shall be kept on file and be available for public inspection at the office of the Borough Clerk.
- 3. This agreement shall take be effective as of January 1, 2023 and shall continue in full force and effect for one (1) year, expiring on December 31, 2023.

## **ORDINANCE 2022-13**

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOROUGH OF BARNEGAT LIGHT, COUNTY OF OCEAN, STATE OF NEW JERSEY, AMENDING THE BOROUGH WATER/SEWER ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR REVISED WATER & SEWER RATES, FEES AND CHARGES.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Borough Council of the Borough of Barnegat Light, County of Ocean, State of New Jersey, as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 153-17 of Article I of Chapter 153 of the Borough Code of the Borough of Barnegat Light, entitled "Water rates and charges," is hereby amended and supplemented to provide as follows:

Chapter 153 SEWERS AND WATER

Article I

Operation and Supervision of Systems

§ 153-17. Water rates, fees and charges.

The following rates, fees and charges shall be made and collected for the services and facilities of the comprehensive water system, commencing the service year of 2023:

As of January 1, 2023, all commercial and residential establishments shall be metered and the owner must bear the cost of meter, installation, and any and all repairs and maintenance of such meter or meters.

#### Commercial properties.

The following water rates shall apply to commercial properties/users:

Commercial property/user flat fee = \$350 per year (\$87.50 per quarter)

For each additional commercial unit, whether contained in a multi-unit structure or mixed-use project, there shall be an additional commercial user flat fee of \$350 per year (\$87.50 per quarter).

Commercial property/user gallonage use fee: In addition to the flat fee noted above, commercial properties/users shall be charged for gallonage use at the rate of \$0.00268 per gallon of water used in excess of 14,000 gallons.

### Residential properties.

The following water rates shall apply to residential properties/users:

Residential property/user flat fee = \$300 per year (\$75 per quarter)

For each additional dwelling unit, whether contained in a duplex, apartment, condominium or other multifamily structure or mixed-use project, there shall be an additional residential user flat fee of \$300 per year (\$75 per quarter).

Residential property/user gallonage use fee: In addition to the flat fee noted above, each residential dwelling unit user shall be charged for gallonage use at the following rates, calculated quarterly:

Notwithstanding any provision to the contrary, effective January 1, 2023 all new residential construction, and major renovations to any structure, including residential dwelling units, shall install remote-read water service connection meters and meter pits, in accordance with the specifications adopted by the Borough Superintendent. No Certificate of Occupancy for any such new construction or renovation shall be issued until a certification of the installation of the appropriate water meter is provided by the Borough Superintendent to the Construction Code Official. For the purpose of this subsection, major renovation shall mean any repair, reconstruction, rehabilitation addition, or other improvement of a structure, the cost of which equals or exceeds 50% of the assessed value of the structure either before the improvement is started or if the structure has been damaged and is being restored before the damage occurred. Substantial improvement is commenced when the first alteration of any structural part of the building is begun.

All water service connection meters and equipment shall be obtained from a vendor with specifications provided by the water/sewer department.

Water connection activation/reinspection fee: \$50 (per occurrence)

Turn Off Fee: \$175 (for the first hour or part thereof), plus \$200 per hour for each hour or part thereof after the first hour

Water service charges for all commercial and residential properties shall be billed and payable quarterly. Payment shall be due on the 15<sup>th</sup> of the month following the quarter. All quarters shall have a 10-day grace period before interest charges begin to accrue. Interest charged on late payments shall be calculated from the due date. In the event of unforeseen circumstances, the Mayor and Borough Council may adjust the due dates and grace periods as determined by Resolution of the governing body.

1<sup>ST</sup> quarter (January-March) shall be due on April 15<sup>th</sup>
 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter (April-June) shall be due on July 15th
 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter (July -September) shall be due on October 15th
 4<sup>th</sup> quarter October-December) shall be due on January 15<sup>th</sup>

SECTION 2. Section 153-29 of Article II of Chapter 153 of the Borough Code of the Borough of Barnegat Light, entitled "Sewer rates and charges," is hereby amended and supplemented to provide as follows:

Chapter 153 SEWERS AND WATER

> Article II Sewer Use

§ 153-29. Sewer rates, fees and charges.

The following rates, fees and charges shall be made and collected for the services and facilities of the comprehensive sewerage system commencing the 2023 service year:

Residential properties.

The following sewer rates shall apply to residential properties/users:

Flat fee for each single dwelling unit, whether contained in single-family residence, duplex, apartment, condominium or other multi-family structure or mixed-use project: \$475 annually (118.75 per quarter)

For each additional dwelling unit, whether contained in a duplex, apartment, condominium or other multi-family structure or mixed-use project: \$475 annually (118.75 per quarter)

In addition to all the above pertaining to a multifamily structure and project, all metered use attributable to the multifamily structure or project, without regard to form of ownership, and not attributable separately to each dwelling unit, shall be charged to the owner, occupant or association as the case may be, according to the commercial establishment schedule set forth below.

Sewer service charges for all commercial and residential properties shall be billed and payable quarterly, Payment shall be due on the 15<sup>th</sup> of the month following the quarter. All quarters shall have a 10-day grace period before interest charges begin to accrue. Interest charged on late payments shall be calculated from the due date. In the event of unforeseen circumstances, the Mayor and Borough Council may adjust the due dates and grace periods as determined by Resolution of the governing body.

1<sup>ST</sup> quarter (January-March) shall be due on April 15<sup>th</sup>

2<sup>nd</sup> quarter (April-June) shall be due on July 15th

3<sup>rd</sup> quarter (July -September) shall be due on October 15th

4<sup>th</sup> quarter October-December) shall be due on January 15<sup>th</sup>

#### **Commercial Sewer**

The following rates shall apply to commercial properties/users sewer charges:

Commercial property/user flat fee = \$475 annually (118.75 per quarter)

Commercial property/user gallonage use fee: In addition to the flat fee noted above, commercial properties/users shall be charged for gallonage use at the rate of \$0.00268 per gallon for each gallon in excess of 14,000 per quarter

When a property requires a disconnect from the sewer system, the owner and plumber shall be responsible for disconnecting the sewer and capping the sewer lateral. The water and sewer department will require 48 hours notice prior to installation/disconnection in order to schedule an inspection. An inspection fee of \$50 will be required for each sewer service lateral.

Inspection of disconnected sewer and cap: \$50

Turn Off Fee: \$175 (for the first hour or part thereof), plus \$200 per hour for each hour or part thereof after the first hour

SECTION 3. All ordinances of parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its enactment after second reading and publication as required by law.
