COMMITTEE REPORTS:

PUBLIC WORKS: Councilman Wellington reported as follows:

- Basic maintenance; such as grass cutting and keeping the brush cut back at the street ends
- Stained exterior of the dock and pavilion restrooms
- Now in the process of staining the pavilion
- Work continues on the new booth-waiting for electrical
- New steps for the boat docks are being built

DOCKS AND HARBORS: Councilman Alloway reported as follows:

- 20 kayaks were confiscated and only 2 have been claimed
- Ramp is busy

BEACHES AND PARKS: Councilwoman Reynolds reported as follows:

- Reported on the beach badge revenue, \$21,000 more than last year
- Safe Beach Day website gives information to users such as, which beaches are guarded, hazard level and water temperature
- Reported on the rescues, EMT call/First Aid, and a lost person
- LBI Lifeguard races, Barnegat Light placed 3rd
- Reported the dog park and pickleball revenue
- She said there was talk regarding a small dog park
- Wildflowers Dog Show is tomorrow

Councilman Wellington discussed the construction of a small dog area inside of the existing dog park.

Include the installation of a contained area to bring small dogs into the area separately from the big dogs

- Replacement of the existing batting cage fencing
- Upgrade the existing batting cage located inside of the dog park
- Re-grading the batting cage ground surface
- Installation of a proper home plate and pitcher's mound
- Creation of a back stop against the east wall of the batting cage area to allow for the use of the town property east of the dog park for La cross, soccer, and other general practice
- This motion includes the option and provision to use any unused grant money recently received for the equipment requested for the bay beach upgrade
- Provide for an increase of the non-resident dog fee to \$100 per season to help offset the cost of construction
- Estimates for the complete fencing are approximately \$16,000.
- New key fob entry system

Motion to proceed with small dog park was made by Wellington, seconded by Alloway and carried by all.

WATER/SEWER: Councilwoman Foley reported as follows:

- Broken water main repaired by DPW
- Getting quotes to clean the exterior of the water tower

PUBLIC SAFETY: Councilman Mikuletzky reported as follows:

- Make the court report a part of the meeting minutes
- Reported on the revenue from the court
- There was talk about dogs on the beach and bay areas.
- He was disappointed LBTPD not giving tickets for dogs on the beach.

Sponge Washburn said dog waste was much better this year than the past and added that a lot of people steal the doggie bags.

Councilman Wellington said he would like to comment on the small dog park as requested by Councilwoman Reynolds.

Councilman Wellington said that he would like to make a motion to construct a small dog area inside of the existing dog park as follows:

- Installation of a contained area to bring small dogs into the area separately from the big dogs
- Replacement of the existing batting cage fencing and upgrade of the existing batting cage located inside of the dog park to include re-grading the batting cage ground surface

- Installation of a proper home plate and pitcher's mound
- Creation of a back stop against the east wall of the batting cage area to allow for the use of the town property east of the dog park for lacrosse, soccer, etc.
- Option and provision to use any unused Recreational Grant money recently received for the equipment requested for the bay beach upgrade
- Provide for an increase of the non-resident dog fee to \$100 per season to help offset the cost of construction.
- Estimates for the complete fencing are approximately \$16,000.

There was a discussion about the key fob system.

Motion to proceed with small dog park was made by Wellington, seconded by Alloway and carried by all.

Tim Brindley, 1404 Bayview Avenue, said there was a lot of seaweed at the bay beach and it may be contributing to water quality. The mayor said it wasn't seaweed but rather it would be directly due to dog waste.

Emma Lapansky, was at the meeting to talk about her proposal to open a bed and breakfast. The mayor told her that would be a planning board issue.

Bruce Allen, 1405 Seaview Avenue, questioned the fees/fines that were collected by the court. He said he didn't think the police weren't giving out enough tickets. He added that he read the contract. The mayor asked for clarification on what he actually wanted the police to do. Sponge Washburn said that he felt that they could give more tickets but when there's an emergency, they are there and we couldn't ask for better response in these situations.

Rich Brodman, 4 E 10th Street, said that the Barnegat Light Taxpayers' Assoc. in conjunction with the Joint Council would be doing a beach clean-up on September 9th and their last general meeting would be on September 23rd. He said they would be showing the movie, Drift, at the pavilion on September 30, 2023 at sundown, he added that Harvey Cedars, High Bar Harbor and Loveladies would also be invited.

Mayor Larson said that Barbra Schumann, 16 E 26th Street, is getting a speaker to talk to a group of people about the wind mills at the pavilion on the 27^{th} of August.

Tim Brindley saw that the police had a sting operation at 6th Street due to many people not stopping. He said that its dangerous because people just roll right through.

ORDINANCE 2023-10

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOROUGH OF BARNEGAT LIGHT, COUNTY OF OCEAN, STATE OF NEW JERSEY, AMENDING AND SUPPLEMENTING CHAPTER 66 OF THE BOROUGH CODE, ENTITLED "BRUSH, WEEDS & GRASS" TO PROVIDE FOR THE REGULATION OF INVASIVE BAMBOO PLANTS.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Borough Council of the Borough of Barnegat Light, County of Ocean, State of New Jersey, as follows:

SECTION 1. Chapter 66 of the Borough Code of the Borough of Barnegat Light is hereby amended and supplemented to provide a new Section 66-6, to be entitled "No Maintaining or Planting of Bamboo Plants," to read as follows:

Chapter 66

BRUSH, WEEDS & GRASS

§ 66-6. No Maintaining or Planting of Bamboo Plants.

a. The in-ground planting of bamboo plants is prohibited in the Borough of Barnegat Light. b. Regulation of and limitations on existing bamboo plants.

1. All property owners must control the growth of bamboo plants on their property. Failure to control and/or prevent the spread of such vegetation beyond the boundaries of any property within the Borough is a violation of this section.

2. All existing bamboo plantings must be contained by appropriate physical barriers to prevent growth or spread beyond the boundaries of a resident's property.

c. Removal of bamboo plants. In the event invasive bamboo

plant(s) are present on any plot of land, or any other premises or place in the Borough, the Borough shall serve written notice to the property owner to remove or abate the violation within such time as shall be specified in such notice. The cost of abatement shall be borne by the property owner. If the owner fails to comply with such notice within the time period specified herein, the Borough may remove or otherwise control the plant(s) and recover the cost of such removal/control from the property owner, and place a lien on the property to recover the cost of said removal.

d. Penalty. A violation of this section shall be punishable as provided in Chapter I, General Provisions, § 1-15. A continuation of such violation for each successive day shall constitute a separate offense and the person or persons allowing or permitting the continuation of such violation will be punished as provided above for each separate offense.

SECTION 2. All ordinances of parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.
